Homily of Bishop Barres

November 1, 2023

Happy All Saints Day to one and all!

It is a great day to celebrate our baptismal call to heroic holiness and a Catholic missionary spirit!

We remember that "every saint is like a ray of light streaming forth from the Word of God." (Pope Benedict, *Verbum Domini* 48)

We remember during this time of Eucharistic Revival in the United States that the saints are rays of light that stream from the Gloria, the Creed, and the Eucharistic Prayers of the Catholic Mass.

In the Book of Revelation, we see a powerful image of the Communion of Saints as they stand before the throne of the Lamb, wearing white robes, holding palm branches calling us to holiness, calling us to live the Beatitudes heroically and courageously.

Saints inspire us to have a burning desire for Heaven and Eternal life, a burning desire that lights their path and destiny on Earth.

In the 5th Chapter of the Gospel of Matthew, we hear Our Lord proclaim the Beatitudes.

Blessed are the poor in spirit...

Blessed are they who mourn...

Blessed are the meek...

Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness...

Blessed are the merciful...

Blessed are the clean of heart...

Blessed are the peacemakers...

Blessed are those who are persecuted...

These Beatitudes are a portrait of Jesus Himself.¹

The Beatitudes inspire the Catholic saints of every century to humbly strive to live Jesus and spread the Kingdom of God.

Every saint's life is a ray of light streaming from the Beatitudes.

I would like to encourage all of us to study and pray Jesus in the lives, biographies, writings, charisms and ecclesial missions of the saints.

Think of the process of choosing your Confirmation saint's name.

If you are attracted by the holiness and virtue of a saint, that means the Holy Spirit is asking you to develop and express some of the virtues and qualities of that saint but through your own personality and your own moment in world and church history.

Let's review some groups of saints according to common themes to illustrate how the spirit of communion and mission of these saints help to inspire us to "holiness and mission" in our time:

Let's think of the great Biblical Saints who inspire us to be on fire with the Bible:

Today, let's think of the great Saints of France.

We pray this morning here at St. Agnes Cathedral in Rockville Centre that as Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris is rebuilt so too may the Catholic Church in France be rebuilt with the intercession of the great French Saints and our prayers. So many of them prayed in Notre Dame and were inspired in their ecclesial missions by their experience of the Art, Architecture, and Liturgy of Notre Dame.

We ask the intercession of: Saint Denis (3rd Century), St. Bernard of Clairvaux (1090-1153), St. Louis IX (1214-1270), St. Joan of Arc (1412-1431), St. Francis de Sales (1567-1622) and St. Jane de Chantal (1572-1641), St. Vincent de Paul (1581-1660) and St. Louise de Marillac (1591-1660), St. Margaret Mary Alacoque (1647-1690) and St. Claude de la Columbiere (1641-1682), St. Jean-

Baptiste de La Salle (1651-1719), St. Louis de Montfort (1673-1716), St. John Eudes (1601-1680), St. Benedict Joseph Labre (1748-1783), Blessed William Joseph Chaminade (1761-1850), St. Madeleine Sophie Barat (1779-1865), St. Jeanne Jugan (1792-1819), St. John Vianney (1786-1859) and St. Pierre Jean Eymard (1811-1868), Blessed Frederic Ozanam (1813-1853), St. Catherine Laboure (1806-1876), St. Bernadette Soubirous (1844-1879), St. Terese of Lisieux (1873-1897), Sts. Louis and Zelie Martin (1823-1894) and St. Marie-Azelie Guerin (1831-1877), St. Elizabeth of the Trinity (1880-1906), St. Charles de Foucauld (1858-1916) and many others, including the Mother of the Church, Our Lady of Paris.

We pray for all the souls of every century who have walked through, worshiped and prayed at Notre Dame Cathedral.

Let's think of the great Missionary Saints of the United States of America.

The great Catholic evangelization pioneers of this country were contemplative and swash-buckling missionary risk-takers.

St. Isaac Jogues (1607-1646) and Companions, St. Juniper Serra (1713-1784), St. John Neumann (1811-1860), Blessed Fr. Michael McGivney (1852-1890), Blessed Fr. Solanus Casey (1870-1957), Blessed Fr. Stanley Rother (1935-1981), St. Mother Francis Xavier Cabrini (1850-1917), St. Katherine Drexel (1858-1955), St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (1774-1821), Blessed Sr. Miriam Teresa Demjanovich (1901-1927), St. Kateri Tekakwitha (1656-1680), Venerable Pierre Toussaint (1766-1853), Venerable Fr. Augustus Tolton² (1854-1897), Venerable Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen (1895-1979), Servant of God Sr. Thea Bowman (1937-1990) – the list of holy American Eucharistic missionaries goes on and on to the present day.

Finally, let's go to Mary, Our Lady, the Mother of the Church and the Queen of All Saints.

We ask Mary's intercession today that we may become the Catholic saints each of us is called to be – in our time, in our place, in our own unique circumstances of life.
