Today on Long Island - The Grim Truth

Pre-pandemic there was the lowest food insecurity rates in more than 20 years. *The pandemic has reversed this improvement.*

- Covid-19 has resulted in 63% increase in food insecurity. (From LI Cares Newsday Jan 18, 2021)
- Nearly 480,000 of our Long Island neighbors are struggling to put food on their tables. (From LI Cares Newsday Jan 18, 2021)
- Approximately 33% of Long Island households are considered ALICE (Asset Limited Income Restrained and Employed) and they regularly turn to community pantries, such as parish outreach programs for emergency and ongoing food assistance, **even before the pandemic**.
- In 2018, there were more than 3,781 people living in shelters or on the streets, only a 3% drop from the prior year **pre-COVID-19**.
- There has been a spike in fatal drug use since the pandemic. Progress in Long Island's opioid crisis has evaporated. By late August 2020, there has been a 40% increase in overdoses. (From Newsday December 11, 2020)
