

ABOUT THE EUCHARISTIC PILGRIMAGE & REVIVAL

The National Eucharistic Revival is a three-year initiative that aims to allow Catholics to grow in their Eucharistic Faith and have a deeper relationship with Christ.

The goal of the Revival is to help engage the broader community in the Eucharist, which is the "source and summit of the Christian life." The Revival began on Corpus Christi Sunday 2022 and will culminate on Pentecost 2025.

At this point in the Revival, the Church in the United States is being brought together for a National Eucharistic Pilgrimage. Taking four routes from "coast-to-coast" the Eucharistic Pilgrimage will bring people together in a procession to the Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis on July 17th-21st. On May 25th & 26th, the Eucharistic Procession will go through New York City.

Venerable Pierre Toussaint

Venerable Pierre Toussaint (1766-1853) was born a slave in Haiti and died a freeman in New York City. He is credited by many with being the father of Catholic Charities in New York. Pierre was instrumental in raising funds for the first Catholic orphanage and began

the city's first school for black children. He also supported the Oblate Sisters of Providence, a religious community of black nuns founded in Baltimore and played a vital role in providing resources to erect Old Saint Patrick's Cathedral in Lower Manhattan. During a Yellow Fever epidemic, Pierre Toussaint cared for the sick and the dying. He was a successful entrepreneur, who did not hesitate to share the fruits of his labor with others.

Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini

Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini was born in northern Italy in 1850. From a young age, she was amazed at the idea of becoming a missionary. As a young woman, she was asked to form a new religious community, the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Her deepest desire was to go to China, but was sent by Pope Leo XIII to serve the Italian Immigrant community in the United States, especially New York.

Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton



Elizabeth Ann Seton had no extraordinary gifts. She was not a mystic or stigmatic. She did not prophesy or speak in tongues.

She had two great devotions: abandonment to the will of God and an ardent love for the Blessed Sacrament. She wrote to a friend, Julia Scott, that she would prefer to exchange the world for a "cave or a desert." "But God has given me a great deal to do, and I have always and hope always to prefer his will to every wish of my own." Her brand of sanctity is

open to everyone if we love God and do his will.

EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL ACTIVITY PATCHES

The activities below are designed to encourage all to learn more about the True Presence of Christ in the Eucharist. Participants are required to complete the main central patch requirement first before any auxiliary activity patches may be displayed. All eight auxiliary activity patches may be earned and any five may be placed around the central patch.

EARNING THE PATCHES

- 1. The Central Eucharistic Revival Patch can be achieved by attending Mass and receiving the Eucharist for 12 weeks, preferably consecutively.
- 2. The Reconciliation Patch can be achieved by receiving the Sacrament of Reconciliation (or studying the Ten Commandments if the Scout has not made First Penance).
- 3. The Rosary Patch can be achieved by praying one Rosary for the Joyful, Luminous, Sorrowful, and Glorious Mysteries.
- 4. The Family Prayer Patch can be achieved by participating in family prayer (at least weekly) for 12 weeks.
- 5. The Eucharistic Adoration Patch can be achieved by attending Eucharistic Adoration, preferably with one's family)
- 6. The Eucharistic Miracles Patch can be achieved by learning about and discussing five Eucharistic Miracles.
- 7. The Eucharistic Procession Patch can be achieved by participating in a Eucharistic Procession..
- 8. The Eucharistic Activity Patch can be achieved by younger Scouts who attend a Catholic activity where the theme is the Eucharist. Older Scouts and Adults may achieve this by attending a Catholic retreat where the theme is the Eucharist.
