PASSION SUNDAY 2020

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The Passion Narrative according to the Gospel of Matthew shows us powerfully and poignantly the range of Our Lord's experience of suffering in his Passion: groundless arrest, betrayal by one of his closest disciples, the flight of his best friends, inhuman interrogation and tortures, false accusations, perjuries, the political shifting of blame onto the shoulders of an innocent and defenseless man, derision, condemnation as a lawbreaker and criminal, condemnation to death, physical collapse under the cross, defamation, sensation-mongering, the ultimate experience of scapegoating in all of world history, and the experience of abandonment by God.1

The Cross of Jesus Christ is the central point in the history of the world and it is the central point of the life history of every human being and every soul.2

The Cross stays still while the World turns.3

What we believe about the Cross of Jesus Christ determines what we believe about life itself.4

Each one of us has carried a wide range of Crosses in the course of our lives. Each Cross has a unique shape and contour. Each Cross has a mysterious and providential purpose.

We have a rudder: by his cross we have been redeemed. We have a hope: by his Cross we have been healed and embraced so that nothing and no one can separate us from his redeeming love."

May this virtual Holy Week of 2020 be a time of great evangelizing grace for the Church and the World and may the Holy Spirit ignite in each one of us a spirit of heroic and courageous holiness and mission.

May there be a massive return of Catholics to the full practice of their Catholic faith as the Crucified Christ lifts high his Cross and raises his wounded hands to the World.
